



Conference Level-Set

Conference objectives, assumptions, and guidelines to create an environment that facilities open and meaningful discussion.

Conference Charge: What can be done *right now* to work with communities to move the needle on addressing environmental impacts on health? How can we measure success so that these immediate actions are sustained?

Objectives:

- 1. Receive solutions-oriented information on the dimensions of environmental justice and climate change that impact Georgia residents.
- 2. Discuss and actively brainstorm what community work can be done right now to move the needle on improving human and environmental health.
- 3. Break information silos through information sharing focused on identifying solutions to heal and improve the health and environment for all Georgians.

Assumptions

- 1. Assume all present are acting with positive intent.
- 2. Everyone's lived experience is different; everyone's ideas and stories add unique and valuable perspectives.
- 3. Regardless of how we got here, our natural environment is under undue stress and undergoing rapid change; we must act to mitigate current issues and prevent future harm.
- 4. Historically marginalized communities are the most burdened by climate change and historically have been left out of the conversations around solutions.
- 5. Race and income have been determining factors in environmental injustice.
- 6. During this conference we will all have the opportunity to be both learners and teachers.

Guidelines

- $1.\,\mathrm{Be}$ present in the moment.
- 2. Listen to understand, not to respond.
- 3. Remember W.A.I.T. "Why Am I Talking?" Ensure everyone has a chance to be heard. Do not interrupt. Be mindful of how long you are talking.
- 4. Use "I" statements.
- 5. Explain your acronyms and jargon.
- 6. Value people time, talent, expertise, experience, position, opinions.
- 7. Assume positive intent. Remember we are all human and are all trying our best to do the right thing.
