The Tift Site in East Point, GA has languished as a Class 1 Hazardous Waste site for 30 years. Its industrial contaminants continue to pollute the headwaters of the South River despite regulatory mandates for cleanup. This panel brings together community organizers, researchers, and policy workers to show how the South River Watershed Alliance built community power through water testing, open records requests, and resident mobilization. They ultimately forced Georgia's EPD back to the negotiating table. Attendees will leave with practical tools to demand accountability and take action against environmental injustice in their own communities.

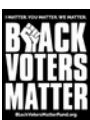
